Colbeck supports new law on veterans' care

Senate legislation signed into law late last year ensures Cold War-era veterans can continue to receive services at our veterans' homes.

Under the new law, Public Act 341 of 2010, if a veteran qualifies for VA benefits for long-term care or day care, they are eligible for admission to the Jacobetti Home for Veterans in Marquette and the Grand Rapids Home for Veterans.

Currently, 20 percent of the veterans at the two homes served during the Cold War.

SB 282 would establish Patriot Week

Legislation recently passed by the Senate encourages Michigan residents to honor the First Principles, founders, documents and symbols of our country during Patriot Week.

Under Senate Bill 282, this special observance would begin on the solemn day of September 11 and conclude on September 17, Constitution Day.

Patriot Week provides a great opportunity for all of us to renew the spirit of America through an understanding and celebration of what makes us the greatest nation in history.

Colbeck supports Gold Star Family plate

I believe we should help families honor loved ones who died in service to our country.

Under Public Act 46 of 2011 (Senate Bill 102), a spouse, parent, sibling or child of a member of the armed services who died during combat could apply for a special license plate inscribed with a gold star and the words "Gold Star Family."

This special plate would not only honor the sacrifices borne by our military families, but act as a "moving memorial" for those who lost their lives in combat.

Currently, Michigan offers specialty plates recognizing prisoners of war, veterans of World War II, Vietnam and other conflicts, Pearl Harbor survivors, disabled veterans and Purple Heart medal recipients.


Michigan Senate remembers
